Question: The prevention of violence against young women and girls in Mexico

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Preamble:

*Recalling* the Charter of the United Nations and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which affirm equality between women and men as well as respect for human dignity,

*Referring* to the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women and to the Convention on the Rights of the Child, which recognize the right of girls to live free from all forms of violence,

*Emphasizing that*, according to UN Women data, one in three women worldwide experiences physical or sexual violence during her lifetime,

*Gravely concerned that* in Mexico nearly one quarter of women have experienced physical or sexual violence committed by their partner,

*Noting with concern that* psychological violence constitutes the most widespread form of violence against women and girls,

*Recognizing that* Mexico has laws and protection structures against violence directed at women, but that their implementation remains unequal across territories,

*Convinced that* preventing violence from childhood and adolescence constitutes an essential means of sustainably reducing violence against girls and young women,

*Emphasizing* the importance of education on healthy relationships, respect and consent, as well as access to appropriate support services for victims,

Clauses

1. *Notes with concern that* violence against girls and young women remains high in Mexico despite the existence of legal frameworks and protection structures;
2. *Encourages* the development of violence-prevention programs based on education promoting respectful relationships with others, mutual respect and consent, particularly for adolescents and young adults;
3. *Invites* Member States, with the support of UN Women, to further involve boys and young men in awareness-raising actions in order to combat social norms that may legitimize gender-based violence;
4. *Recommends* expanding access to local support services, notably women's justice centers, health services and psychological support for victims;
5. *Supports* the continuous training of professionals in the education, health and social sectors in order to better detect, prevent and respond to situations of violence against girls and young women;
6. *Also encourages* cooperation between national authorities and civil society and international organizations to ensure effective monitoring of the prevention and protection measures implemented.
